Main purpose and why this role matters: You will be supporting HWT and other volunteers to improve the condition of local Hereford Brooks

Location: Hereford city

Who will support you: Nature Recovery Officer

Time commitment: Various, usually a set day a week

About us:

Herefordshire Wildlife Trust is part of The Wildlife Trust movement. There are 46 Wildlife Trusts across the whole of the UK, the Isle of Man and Alderney. Together we have more than 870,000 members, over 32,500 volunteers, 2,500 staff and 600 trustees. The Wildlife Trusts are the largest UK voluntary organisation dedicated to conserving the whole range of the UK's habitats and species.

Herefordshire Wildlife Trust, along with each of the other 45 Wildlife Trusts, is an independent, autonomous charity with its own Trustees. We are a member of the Royal Society of Wildlife Trusts (RSWT) which operates as an umbrella organisation for all 46 Wildlife Trusts and helps coordinate campaigns at a national level. We're working towards 30% of the county being well-managed for nature by 2030, and volunteers are absolutely essential to making this happen – we can't recover nature without you.

About the role and the team you'll be volunteering with:

Herefordshire Wildlife Trust has received initial support from The National Lottery Heritage Fund of £265,536, made possible thanks to National Lottery players, to fund the development phase of an exciting new project: Hereford ~ River City. The project will establish Hereford as a 'river city'; where nature thrives within the network of waterways and surrounding wetland areas which are enjoyed by all. It will focus on three key aspects of the waterways: restoring the habitats for wildlife, uncovering and sharing their history and connecting people of all ages to these wonderful natural environments.

Main tasks:

Assisting our Project Officers and community groups with practical tasks, including but not limited to:

- Habitat management
- Preparing sites for future restoration work in the delivery phase of the project
- Litter picking
- Invasive Non-Native Species (INNS) control
- Potential annual fish rescue due to low water levels in the brooks

Skills/qualities we're looking for:

Whilst we would invite all those interested in joining our work parties to get in touch with us these can be physically demanding roles and require an extended period of time spent out of doors. The skills we would look for from our volunteers are:

- Reasonable level of fitness
- Willingness to work out of doors all day all year around in all weathers
- A genuine enthusiasm for wildlife and habitats
- Punctuality
- Ability to work as part of a team
- Ability to listen to and follow instructions
- Awareness and understanding of risk in relation to tools and practical work
- Previous practical conservation work experience
- An in-date first aid certificate (please provide certificate)
- An in-date ticket for use of power tools including chain saw or brush-cutter (please provide certificate)

- Bird and invertebrate surveys
- Camera traps and fixed-point photography
